

Who was the first living artist to have a solo exhibition at the Louvre?

Georges Braque

Thank You **Jack Davis** who answered this trivia question correctly and to **Debi West** who answered it about 2 minutes after Jack did.

At seventy-nine, Georges Braque became the first living artist to be accorded a solo exhibition at The Louvre. In 1961 at the age of seventy-nine, Georges Braque became the first living artist to be accorded a **solo exhibition at the Musée du Louvre, L'Atelier de Braque**. Braque was also famously commissioned to paint a **ceiling fresco at the Louvre in 1953 'The Birds'** is still on permanent display at the museum. These three panels show a large bird, a motif from the latter stages of Braque's life. Braque thought the motif "universal", allowing him to paint space while respecting two-dimensional constraints.

2022 National Emeritus Art Educator of the Year

This prestigious award encompasses the qualities of professional leadership, teaching and community service in visual art, exhibited on a continuous basis both before and after the date of retirement. Because this is a national emeritus award, emphasis is credited to the longevity and scope of devoted passion dedicated to the field of visual art after retirement. This year, we had many exceptionally qualified candidates from which the judges had to choose. It gives me great pleasure to announce that NAEA's *2022 National Emeritus Art Educator of the Year Award* goes to **Nancy Walkup** from Santa Fe, New Mexico!

The nomination letter and two letters of support were so beautifully written and spoke volumes to the quality of service displayed over the course of Nancy's career and far into retirement. Therefore, I have chosen to use their own words to explain the passion of Nancy's long commitment.

NAEA National Secondary Art Educator of the Year Departments Chair, Overton HS, Memphis University of Memphis, Adjunct Instructor


Dr. Emily "Boo" Ruch, NBCT, Retired Art Educator

My greatest joy in teaching comes from watching my students experience that "ah-ha" moment when the light bulb finally clicks "on" to a new understanding absorbed, a difficult challenge overcome, or a creative path realized. I am a life-coach, a teacher, an encourager, a cheerleader of sorts... who is invested in each student throughout their lives.

Born and raised in Memphis, Tennessee, I received my B.A. in Commercial Art from the University of Alabama...Roll Tide!... my M.ED. in Curriculum & Instruction from Memphis State, and my ED.D. in Instruction and Curriculum Leadership from The University of Memphis. After teaching 31 years in Memphis City Schools... three at Melrose Jr., ten at Snowden, and my last 18 years as Chair of the Visual Art Department at Overton H.S. for the Creative and Performing Arts... I retired from the system in May of 2009. Before retirement I had the opportunity to supervise student teachers in the field and teach as an adjunct instructor in the Art Education department for The University of Memphis. I also mentored teachers from TN and surrounding states for their National Board Certification since I was the first Visual Art Teacher in the state of Tennessee to become a National Board-Certified Teacher (NBCT) in 2003.

Earlier in my career, I was invited to be a People-to-People Ambassador Programs' Delegate to attend an Indigenous Art Curriculum study and exchange program in Australia and New Zealand; and years later was again a Delegate to present original Art Curriculum at the US/ China Joint Educational Conference in Beijing. Utilizing these experiences and my love for creating unique opportunities I have been able to support former students and others in their chosen paths throughout my retirement. I have also enjoyed subbing in the Memphis/Shelby County School System using a visual interpretation to instruct students in any subject. Talk about "ah-ha" moments.... Students who had never been interested in visual art suddenly saw the correlation! Hopefully, sometime in the near future, I will have the time to compile some of these curriculum ideas and the student stories that go with them into a book to share with others.

The year of my Retirement (2009), I was honored to receive the NAEA National Secondary Art Educator of the Year Award and was asked to judge the ... at the time... RAEA Retired Art Educator of the Year Award for the coming year (2010). At the end of that judging cycle I was asked by Bob Curtis and Dean Johns to re-design the rubric for this award. I was happy to accept this challenge because I had spent decades helping to design score sheets for the National Clogging Association which were eventually used globally. Knowing that this prestigious RAEA national award encompassed the qualities of professional leadership, teaching and community service in visual art, exhibited on a continuous basis both before and after the date of retirement; and knowing that because this is a national retirement award, emphasis would need to be credited to the longevity and scope of devoted passion dedicated to the field of visual art after retirement. We eventually changed the title of the award from "Retired" to "Emeritus". I have served as the Emeritus Award's Chair since 2010



While I have received many local, state, regional and national awards in the past; and while I have been active in many areas of the visual art experience, nothing pleases me more than to engage in activities which continue to support my students, past and present. I feel very blessed!

The Mac Arthur Goodwin Award for Distinguished Service Within the Profession

Congratulations to Emeritus member Debra "Debi" Barrett-Hayes for receiving The Mac Arthur Goodwin Award for Distinguished Service Within the Profession.

Debra "Debi" Barrett-Hayes taught Secondary Art for four decades at The Florida State University School in Tallahassee, Florida. She first joined NAEA as a graduate student in 1981-82. During her membership, she served as Secondary Division Director at both the State & National levels. **Barrett-Hayes** was active in the Getty Center for Education in the Arts as well as National Board Certification for Art.



Barrett-Hayes received the Florida Art Educator of the year, Southeastern Art Educator of the year, NAEA Secondary Art Educator of the year, the Disney American Teacher Award for the Arts, the National Milken Educator Award, the Christa McAuliffe Award (twice) and the Florida State University's Presidential Award.

As an Art Education advocate, she encourages new professionals to join their Arts Organizations She continues to work as a mixed media painter. Leading by example, she is the parent of Cosby Hayes, a professional muralist with his partner, Sarah Painter (also an Art Teacher). **Debi Barrett-Hayes** resides in Tallahassee with her husband Martin Hayes and pets, S'More (foxhound) and Queenie (Tuxedo Cat). **Debi** stays active with the R.A.T.T.s (Retired Art Teachers of Tallahassee), substituting for Art and any other fun trouble she can find.
