Folk artists Pete Seeger and Joe Hickerson's "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?" echoed sentiments of antiwar protestors during the Vietnam War. In 2022, we find ourselves, the NAEA Equity, Diversity, & Inclusion (ED&I) Commission, reflecting on these timeless lyrics.
