The Grand Hyatt and the Convention center are located right on the River walk! You can walk anywhere from there without even getting on the street. 



What kind of fixative did **Gustav Klimt** use on his artwork? Thank you to **Michael Getting** for being the first one to give the correct answer of **"Cat Urine"**. **Jack Davis** came in a close second by about 15 minutes.

"The Kiss" is undoubtedly one of the most iconic works of the 20th century, and a painting with which nearly everyone is familiar. What fewer people know, however, are the stories about its painter, Gustav Klimt. And what stories they are! A little research will turn up some lascivious details about his life, but even better was his fashion sense (he wore muu-muus with nothing underneath) and his studio was overrun with cats (he is the famous painter version of the "Crazy Cat Lady" stereotype). His obsession with cats actually led him to cover the pages of his sketchbooks with cat urine. He believed it was the best fixative available. The odor was bad, but worse, he destroyed works that would likely be worth millions today.

What teenager has a clearly defined path forward! Looking back to the 70's, I was a jumble, like most others. We all knew what we were good at, what worked, and what didn't. 

I've worked DD into commissions, illustration, Professional Development, and designing homes and studio spaces. We'll see where this takes us. We continue to exhibit, help with galleries, adjudicating scholastic shows, NAEA as asked, and Professional Development. We've found Dunedin, further Pinellas County to be quite a creative and colorful area. And keep up with summer returns to the northeast.
