
## **May Trivia Answer**

# In The Spotlight

**Melody Weintraub** 

President Tennessee Art Education Association TAEA Middle Level Art Educator of the Year RAEA Silent Auction Chair Author for art education periodicals and textbooks

Melody Weintraub is the Past-President of the Tennessee Art Education Association (TAEA). As Past-President, she will have served as conference chair for two state conferences. While serving as President, she helped to usher in several new programs, including STARS (State of Tennessee Art Review and Showcase), and established an outreach for middle Tennessee art teachers most affected by devastating tornados and flooding in 2020 and 2021. In 2014, she was selected as TAEA's Middle Level Art Educator of the Year. Melody will serve in the coming year as the Silent Auction Chair for RAEA.

Melody retired in 2020 after 30 years teaching community classes, and in public, private and higher educational settings. She currently supervises art education candidates virtually for The University of Tennessee, Knoxville. "I love giving back to the art education community in this way," says Melody. "It is so gratifying to be able to use my past experience in the classroom to mentor, encourage and advise these art education interns and job-embedded teachers."

Melody has presented numerous professional development workshops for the National Art Education Association (NAEA) as well as workshops and teacher training in Mississippi, Virginia, Louisiana, South Carolina, Florida, and Nebraska. She's also presented workshops and designed several guitars for The Tennessee Arts Academy (TAA). This July, Melody will be presented with The Joe W. Giles Lifetime Achievement Award from TAA. Melody is also an accomplished artist, participating is several group and solo exhibitions as well as writing and illustrating a children's book, "The Little Bluebird," (2001). She has written over 30 articles for SchoolArts Magazine. Two of her articles were featured on the cover of the magazine. She was also featured in the Davis Publications book, "The Best of SchoolArts STEAM." She will have an article in the upcoming NAEA book, STEAM Education: Transdisciplinary of Art in the Curriculum.

Melody collaborated with educator **Debi West to produce**, "Teacher Encourage-Mints," (a set of 60 motivational cards for teachers). "Debi and I were chatting one day about our concerns for the morale of teachers during and following the pandemic. After tossing around several ideas, Debi and I thought this might be a good way to give teachers a daily reminder of their value to the education community and to the lives of their students."



### Now is the time to encourage your peers.

If you know of an NAEA member who has been retired for 3 or more years and remains actively supporting arts education, then that individual needs to be recognized. The **STATE EMERITUS AWARD** can lead to the **RAEA NATIONAL EMERITUS AWARD**.

If the retired NAEA member has continued to be actively engages in supporting arts education on the local, city, or state levels, then that name needs to be submitted to your state's award chairman by the state's submission date (usually in the summer). The awardee selected at the state level can then be submitted to NAEA from that state to be considered for the RAEA National Emeritus Award by the NAEA Deadline. Nomination packets must be digitally submitted to the NAEA National Office on or before **October 1, 2023**. If that individual has also continued to contribute regionally and nationally to NAEA then that individual could be considered for the RAEA National Emeritus Award. Often the name submitted to national has been a previous state awardee, but not always. Any state winner is eligible to be submitted to NAEA for a national level award. The key to see if you or a colleague, are eligible for a national award is to find and follow the National Rubric for your award found on the NAEA website under **Opportunities/NAEA Awards/ NAEA Awards Program Booklet**.

The RAEA National Emeritus Award recognizes contributions made both before and after retirement, however, the emphasis for this award is aimed more heavily to recognize those individuals still contributing after retirement on a local, statewide, regional and national level. For the RAEA National Emeritus Award, there is a very precise and well-written Rubric that should be considered. When submitting on the national level, the applicant should be short and concise in listing all, important contributions by the year accomplished and divided into "before" and "after" retirement. If you are not recognized the first time you are nominated, please try again. Most of you are still contributing in some way. If your colleague encourages you to put your foot in the ring, please do not hesitate. You are probably terribly busy doing for others but take time to update your resume.

All of you have given your lives in the service of young people.
