### From the President

Have you ever noticed how often artists seem to live to a ripe old age? Famous figures of art history like Michelangelo (89), Picasso (92), Andrew Wyeth (92), Élisabeth Louise Vigée-Le Brun (87), Louise Nevelson (89), Pueblo potter Maria Martinez (93), and Georgia O'Keeffe (99), to name a few. I believe it is because they had a reason that motivated them to get up every day – that reason was the desire to create.

As I am a volunteer at the **Georgia O'Keeffe Museum** (https://okeeffemuseum.org) here in Santa Fe, the only museum in the United States devoted to one woman, I am using **Georgia O'Keeffe** as a prime example of a long-lived, productive artist. If you come to Santa Fe, you should definitely schedule a visit to her museum and her home in Abiquiú, about an hour north of Santa Fe. (Tickets for both the house and museum are available online.) You can't visit her house at Ghost Ranch but they do have landscape tours that feature her paintings (and horseback rides). 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O'Keeffe is an excellent role model for us, as **she kept working long into her later years.** She also left us some incredible quotes:

- -"I've been absolutely terrified every moment of my life and I've never let it keep me from a single thing that I wanted to do."
- -"The days you work are the best days."
- -"The 'To create one's world in any of the arts' takes courage."
- -"The morning is the best time, there are no people around. My pleasant disposition likes the world with nobody in it."

Interesting Facts about Georgia O'Keeffe (in no particular order)

She is considered to be the **Mother of American Modernism**. She studied with <u>Arthur Wesley Dow, who pretty much introduced the elements and principles of art</u>. She completely curated her whole life, including her houses, furnishings, and clothing, which you will see if you take a tour of her **Abiquiú, house**. (https://www.okeeffemuseum.org/homes).

She never let anyone watch her paint. She was born the same year as Pueblo potter Maria Martinez and lived fairly close to her. She corresponded with Frida Kahlo. Andy Warhol visited her at her Abiquiú house and made a diamond dust screen print of her (https://shorturl.at/pCELU). She visited 49 countries in her lifetime. Her ashes were scattered on the Pedernal mountain she could see from her **Ghost Ranch home.** 

She would take her cat camping. When she taught in West Texas, she put a pony on a table for her students to draw (I met someone who was in that class!). An episode of Breaking Bad was shot at the Museum (season 3, episode 11). **Georgia O'Keeffe did just what she wanted to do. She didn't care much about what anyone else thought about her work or her life. She only had to please herself.**



# In The Spotlight

### **Richard Siegesmund**

Former Deputy Director of the
San Francisco Museum of Modern Art

I retired as Professor Emeritus from Northern Illinois University in 2020, just as the world shut down due to the pandemic. If I had known then that I soon would have the option to teach all my classes on-line, maybe I would have not retired! My wife and I have returned to the neighborhood in Berkeley, CA where we met 35 years ago. Back then, we were two single parents with kids and our sons were best friends in the 4th grade. It's a super sweet origin story.

My route to art education was circuitous. I never was K-12 teacher (I'm not counting my years in high school and college as a summer camp art instructor). The first half of my career was in arts-administration. I rose as high as the Deputy Director of the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art. All the time, I kept asking questions about what people were learning. Our non-profit status was based on our being an educational institution. How exactly, was an art museum educational? I was surprised by how many people found this question annoying. A friend, the head of education at the Philadelphia Museum of Art, told me that I should check out this guy Elliot Eisner. I left SFMOMA and did just that.

After Elliot, my first real teaching job was at the University of Georgia. Sitting in my first class was our RAEA President Elect, Debi West. From that evening on, I never regarded her as my student. We formed a partnership to explore the possibilities of art education together. For 25 years we've kind of been joined at the hip—right up to now on the RAEA board.

Part of that partnership with Debi is a **new book** that was just published in September, <u>Authentic Secondary Art Assessment Snapshots from Art Teacher Practice</u>, that I co-edited with Cathy Smilan. Debi is a contributing author! It's a super chapter (and the *Routledge 20% discount code* is **AFL03** – just saying).








A major strand of my research has been arts-based educational research – what education and all the social sciences can learn from the visual arts. In October, I have another book coming out!

To quote Barbara Laws, I failed retirement.






