We are thrilled to announce Cameron Patricia Downey as our guest speaker for the joint Division Awards Ceremony. The talk, titled There Is No Art Without Dust, will be at the beginning of the program so plan to arrive early to get a seat.



Cameron Patricia Downey (b. 1998) is the current artist in instructional and curatorial residence at **Juxtaposition Arts**. Downey is an anti-disciplinary artist born and raised in North Minneapolis, Minnesota, whose practice oscillates between photography, film, body, sculpture, curation, and otherwise. The incidental, the precarious, and the misremembered are central to this work which strives to archive, unfurl, make-altar-of, and bring fantasy to the blues of Black life and relation.

Downey graduated from Columbia University in 2021 with a double concentration in visual arts and environmental science. Downey's art has been exhibited by HAIR+NAILS, Minneapolis; Engage Projects, Chicago; Aronson Gallery, New York; Kunstraum Kreuzberg/Bethanien, Berlin; Kemper Museum, St. Louis; Macalester College Law Warschaw Gallery, St Paul; as part of Midway Contemporary Art's Off-Site program; M+B Gallery, Los Angeles; and Museum of Contemporary Art, Santa Barbara. They are the 2023 recipient of the Carolyn Glasoe Bailey Foundation's MN Art Prize and a recent artist-in-residence with the Walker Art Center's Moving Image department, Loghaven Artist Residency and Second Shift Studio Space of Saint Paul.

The <u>Art & Creative Materials Institute (ACMI)</u> created Children's Art Month in 1961 as an event to emphasize the value to children from participating in visual arts education.

- In 1969 the celebration expanded to include secondary school students, and the Children's Art Month event officially became known as Youth Art Month.
- In 1984, ACMI created the nonprofit organization <u>The</u> <u>Council for Art Education</u> (CFAE) to advocate for visual arts education.CFAE coordinates the Youth Art Month program at the national level.

While Youth Art Month typically occurs in March, local and state events celebrating visual art education take place on almost a year-round basis! Events and fund-raisers take place in schools, libraries, arts centers, museums, and even state capitol buildings.

The CFAE reviews submissions of states' written and visual documentation. Using a rubric, they award YAM programs for their efforts and successes with varies levels of monetary rewards.
