Bob's inspiring commitment to serve our Art Education profession at local, state, regional and national levels expands well over 50 years! After serving as President for both MAEA and NAEA, Bob led all of us in RAEA as President for 8 years. Continuing to serve as Co-Editor of the RAEA E-Bulletin, Bob also models leadership while mentoring future generations of art educators. It was my true privilege to work with Bob when I joined RAEA.

"Bob continues to share his expertise within our profession by giving presentations aimed at Preservice art teachers, both at state and national levels. Of course, he is also a "Life Trustee" of the National Art Education Foundation (NAEF), for which he began work on planning and development in 1983. He currently serves on Grants Development and Executive/ Finance Committees – always seeking potential donors and encouraging membership to participate in the work of NAEF. He also accepted the "RAEA 2014 Distinguished Service Award" in San Diego. Robert Curtis is truly a National Art Education ICON !!! I can't think of a more deserving recipient for the "National Emeritus Art Educator Award" than our own – Mr. Robert W. Curtis!"

Bob Curtis will be honored at the RAEA Awards Ceremony during the 2017 NAEA convention in New York. Bob will make a presentation highlighting his personal contributions made to the profession. Please join us for this joyous occasion!

Robert W. Curtis was born in Dearborn, Michigan, the firstborn of William and Elizabeth. His parents, though not college educated, recognized the importance of exposing him to available culture. Many weekends were spent at the Detroit Institute of Art, attending concerts, and plays. When he entered school, Bob was privileged to attend the Greenfield Village Schools where beside the basics the arts were integrated into educational life; drawing, painting, weaving, pottery all were offered from day one; generally with an emphasis on the early American tradition of each craft. Of course vocal and instrumental music and traditional dance were a regular part of education. This grounding had an influence on Bob's later development.

Bob's family was always involved in community and that influenced most of Bob's lifes' focus. As a student in high school he broadened his vista but without classes in visual art - that came when he started college. His first college path focused on architecture but difficulty in math and chemistry soon helped change direction toward Interior Design. He received a degree in Interior Design from the University of Michigan; while there he minored in drawing and ceramics and, most importantly pursued art education courses. It was the influence of the art education faculty that led him to enter the field of art education and an active life in the professional association. Further pursuit for the Masters led him to major in Metalsmithing with minors in Sculpture and Ceramics. This diverse study made for a better grounding in the classroom.

Bob began his professional career in 1960 in the Wayne Westland School District .educating in elementary, junior high and senior high art settings. He immediately became active in the curriculum development in his district and in the Region 2 MAEA. MAEA became an important element in Bob's career because he realized that this would be an opportunity to expand his knowledge and also to influence the acceptance of art in the general curriculum. Bob served on the MAEA Council from mid 1960's until the late 1970's. In 1976-1977 he served as MAEA president which led him into leadership positions at the NAEA, His first year at NAEA Assembly was 1976; he co-chaired Ways and Means in 1977, became assembly secretary in 1978-1979, and was elected to the position of National Secondary Director-Elect in 1979. In 1983 Bob was elected NAEA President Elect and served as NAEA President 1985-1987; he is the only NAEA President that served while still maintaining a full time teaching schedule in the junior high school. He was on the committee to develop the National Art Education Foundation and has served as a life trustee since its inception; he currently serves on the Executive/Finance, Grants, Development, Planned Giving and Nominating committees Upon retirement he accepted the invitation to chair the NAEA-RAEA where he served six years and developed a sound financial structure and a structured awards system along with an updating of the Constitution. Along with the MAEA he also became very active in the Michigan Education Association; thus providing the opportunity to inform other disciplines in the necessities of art education for all students. For ten years in the late 1970's Bob chaired an MEA group "The Council of State Organizations" (representing most subject matter organizations that were then affiliated with the MEA.) Another opportunity to inform not only the importance of art education but ways that different disciplines could enhance each other.

Bob's family believed in serving the community. Along with his educational pursuits Bob has generously served the community being active in the Dearborn Community Arts Council including as president, chair of the Dearborn VSA, administering the Homecoming At Fair for over 20 years, chairing the Padzieski Art Gallery for over ten years. Bob served o the board of the Dearborn Historical Society and was a member of the committee to gain historic status for the Ford Homes Historic District in Dearborn.

From 1985 -1995, in addition to being with junior high students during the day, Bob also taught Basic Design Fundamentals at the (Center, now) College of Creative Studies. An experience just as rewarding as in the public school since there is an eagerness in most students to enhance their appreciation and their abilities. Since retiring Bob has continued to serve his profession and his community.

For Bob there is no spare time as each moment is a treasure and an opportunity to grow. When possible he enjoys spending time at his lake home, a great place to meditate and regroup. He enjoys the company of his brother, his chosen family and his many friends. He is even finding time to develop some art work. Currently his passion is photography with the desire to use images to develop new constructs.

Each of us has a destiny, to do good for humanity, for our planet. To find a path that we love and cherish enhances our journey. Bob hopes that his journey has been a benefit for those with whom he has come in contact. He hopes that everyone inner field sees teaching as not a job but a lifelong passion. Every moment is a teachable moment.

Bob's life has been full of wonderful experiences. Success does not come from the work of one individual but through the support of all those who touch your life. Bob is thankful for having been touched by so many wonderful people who have been a part of making his life so rich and satisfying.

The RAEA/NAEA presents a certificate and monetary award to the selected chapter. Two RAEA members, the advisor of the previous year's recipient, and the Preservice Director reviewed the submitted materials and submitted their ratings to a non-voting RAEA member who tallies the scores and reports the results.

The Brigham Young University (BYU) Student Chapter of NAEA, Provo, UT, is the 2017 recipient of the RAEA Outstanding Student Chapter Award. According to Co-Presidents, Aimee Gerlach and Lindsey Jensen, the chapter members "spread the love of art best through service." This has been accomplished by active involvement in the community. Some of the ways that chapter members have been involved include serving at disability centers, helping with public school activities, and serving as jurors for local student exhibitions.

BYU art education faculty provides many opportunities for student chapter members to teach and interact with children. One example is that NAEA student chapter members plan curriculum and teach alongside their professors at their Jumpst(art) Arts Workshop, which is available for elementary and secondary students.

The chapter planned a fundraiser to help raise money for charity and to help support chapter activities by having a Soup Bowl Night. The members produced ceramic bowls in the ceramics studio over several weekends and then sold those bowls at the Soup Bowl Night.


The BYU chapter members seek out and participate in professional development opportunities. They interact with art education professionals on campus as well as at Utah Art Education Association conferences and at National Art Education conventions. Many of the chapter members exhibit their artwork in the BYU campus and the community.

She stated that, "The students are exceptionally giving and caring—many volunteer their time to teach in community arts settings on their own as well as in the group. They are also innovative in their approach to professional development and service."
